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What do you want?

Course Description

Graduating MBAs will spend the next 35 years of their lives working very hard in order to ... Hmm. What IS it that you'll be working for? To maximize your wealth? Fame? Happiness? Power? Peace of mind? Energy? Salvation? To be loved? Friendship? A family? How do these all fit together and in what proportion? How will you avoid losing one for the sake of the other? This course will explore the pros and cons and the ins and outs of these various answers to the fundamental question, what do you want?, and how NOT to become professional anecdotes for books like *Career Success, Personal Failure* and *Must Success Cost So Much?* Given the fourth quarter offering of this course, the readings, film clips, and cases will tend to be shorter, but focused on related questions that examine the meaning of life and career and the nature of "success." If you'd like to put your business education in the context of managing a career over a lifetime, here's one last chance to do so before you re-enter the work-a-day world.

Objectives

The purpose of this course is to give students a chance before graduating to reflect on their strategies for success in the world and to think carefully about how they plan to go about initiating those efforts. Alternative aspects of "success" will be explored from both pros and cons points of view. People who will be in significant positions of power will be invited to consider multiple aspects of "success" and their various impacts on society.

Course Requirements

- A. **Participation and Attendance:** Students are required to attend and participate in classes as with any second year elective and in accordance with the guidelines of the Second Year Program. Participation will account for one third of the final grade.
- B. Case: Each student will write and submit a 1-2 page case describing real people that they know (disguised is fine) who have wrestled with any one of the topics in the course. Cases should be accompanied by a release allowing them to be used in class in the future. Cases will be one third of the final grade.
- C. **Final Presentation:** The final third of your grade will be based on a PowerPoint slide presentation (automated) that lasts no more than 8 minutes. Students should submit an electronic and a hard copy of the presentation when indicated on the calendar. By "automated" I mean, if I double click on the file, it should play from beginning to end without any more clicks. This is a PPS file. Each presentation should have several elements including a personal charter as outlined in the course and your definition of success. The charter should also include significant sections on strategy and goals to guide you in the future. You may include audio or video segments in your slide presentation as you feel appropriate. This presentation should be appropriate for two purposes—to communicate to the instructor your learning and insight during the course and to remind you in 1, 2, and 5 year's time of your aspirations coming out of the course.
